# Reflection on Ontology Summit 2014

- We had a lot of energy and participation by new people

# Critique of Ontology Summit 2014

- Did we build the bridges among the Semantic Web, Big Data, and Applied Ontology communities?
- Relative lack of engagement with Big Data community
- Do we need better alignment of Hackathon projects with Summit topic?
- Do we need a top-down structure (gather leaders together in a “Summit”) or a bottom-up structure (generation and synthesis of ideas by participants)?
- Perhaps we need to have more explicit expectations about the outcomes for the Summit

# Communique

- We took a more collaborative approach to the Communique, directly incorporating key insights contributed by Track Champions. As a result, this was truly a community document that reflected everyone's ideas.
- There is still a difficult tension between Communique-as-Independent-Outcome and Communique-as-Summary.
- We had insufficient time for review by the larger community.
